CHIEF PROBATION OFFICER COMMENTS

2019 was one in which we were becoming fully immersed in using the Supervised Release System (SRS) - a case management system provided by the Indiana Supreme Court, Office of Judicial Administration, Trial Court Technology. After a year of working with SRS, we believe the system is an asset to our agency in working with probationers and service to the court.

Our office implemented a one-time fee for drug tests beginning January 1, 2019. We felt the cost for multiple tests for some probationers was becoming burdensome, and we have never been close to covering even half the costs of test expenditures in a given year. We believed spreading the cost out among all probationers would be helpful, and would allievate someone getting a test at or near the last day of probation having to go make a payment. Also, we can establish a fee at the beginning of probation and not keep adjusting it as tests are administered. \$20.00 was charged to all supervision cases, except those cases that are transferred out immediately after supervision begins, and covers all tests administered during the supervision. Since January, collections in drug test fees have closed the deficit between drug test expenditures (67%). We will continue to watch this for future adjustment recommendations. Also, we will consider a fee scheme for high testing needs, and pretrial/presentence cases.

Personnel changes this year was the loss of a 32 year secretaryto retirement, Susie Reinhard. We wished her well in a celebation on the 4th floor and a gift of a new computer. A few weeks later we welcomed Katrina Okey to the staff. Also, Jack Odle was a field officer during most of the year, but with increased duties in his day job in Adams County he resigned in November. MJ Tipton indicated interest in returning to work for us as a field officer and was reoriented in November. She agreed to be our point person for weekend drug testing, duties that Greg, Vicki, Scott and Allison shared in the past.

The courthouse plaza underwent many changes to the North (front enterance) and West in 2019, during which changes were being planned for supervision changes in the coming year. Discussions were had in regards to probation supervision stategy changes, with further discussions and probable implementation in 2020. The primary purpose for supervision strategy change is to bring Wells County's community supervision up to standards of Indiana's evidence based practices and evidence based decision making. Secondarily, supervision strategy changes should permit improved workloads with more of our limited resources going to the higher need/risk probationers. Community safety, restitution and restoration will continue to be balanced with probationer accountability and overall well-being. During our annual department retreat we decided to target implementation of the new strategies as soon as April 2020. In the same vein, discussions were held regarding pretrial assessment and supervision, with discussions to be ongoing in 2020.
