2020 Annual Report For Judges June 17, 2021

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Introduction

The following annual report excerpts were submitted to Judges Kiracofe and Antrim of the Wells Circuit and Superior Courts respectively in June 2021.

The biggest challenge in 2020 was the COVID19 pandemic. State and locally imposed protocols impacted services tremendously, especially those involving face-to-face contacts. At times, in office staff was reduced to half to avoid exposure and walk-in visitors were prohibited from entering the courthouse. Some of the protocols will have long-lasting effect (video interviews with inmates at the jail), while others are already becoming faint memory (mandatory mask wearing).

Violations Data 2020

The courts requested in the past some data from probation regarding violations. Based on information available in the Supervised Release System (SRS) of INcite, the following information was gleaned from records in 2020 from both juvenile and adult jurisdictions. (All first fillings table).

- Total of 991 supervision cases in 2020
- 27% (269) had a violation filed
- 32% (87) were filed in the first 120 days of supervision
- 39% (104) were for new law violations
- 45% (114) were high or moderate risk
- 35% (58) of the technical violations were for drug use while on probation

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Violation Data 2019

- Comparison data from 2019 is provided below.
- Total of 1028 supervision cases in 2019 from both juvenile and adult jurisdiction
- 38% (386) had a violation filed
- 40% (154) were filed in the first 120 days of supervision
- 31% (119) were for new law violations
- 40% (156) were high or moderate risk
- 51% (136) of the technical violations were for drug use while on probation

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Presentence Investigations Reports (PSI)

- As noted above, 95 PSI's were filed last year.
- We continue to advocate for having resources to fund the PSI consultant because it permits full-time PO's the ability to focus on case management, and a consistency in PSI preparation.

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Pretrial Assessment (PTA)

• We filed 16 PTA last year.
